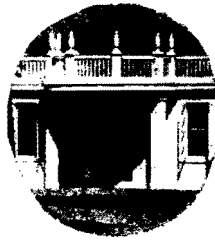

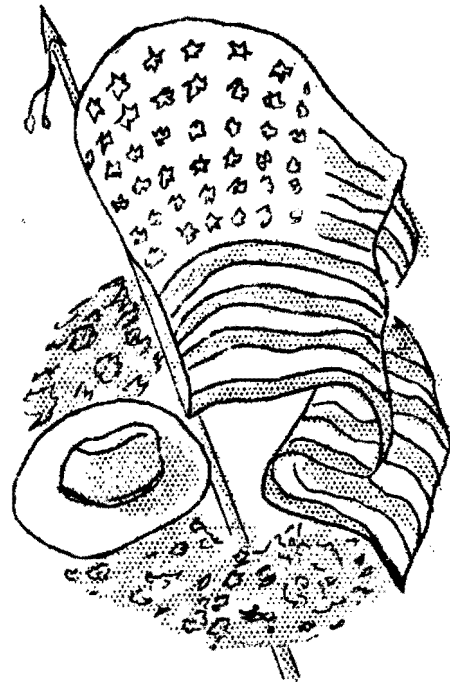

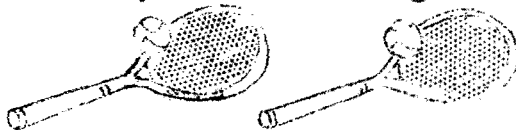
adjustable backs, sun shades and large wheel casters, will induce many to renew interest in tennis in comfort.

HORTICULTURAL

Rosas and perennials that have finished their June blooming should be pruned and given a good application of a balanced mixture of fertilizer as soon as possible. Mr. Rogers of Port Jefferson Station carries a 4-12-4 fertilizer that is excellent for this purpose. Such plants are benefitted by applications of sulphur dust at least once a week from now on, for the checking of fungus disease. Massey dust can be mixed at home and is more reasonable in price than most packaged products. It is made by thoroughly mixing one part arsenate of lead to nine parts sulphur.

Here in Shoreham, July is the month when plants cry out for water. Answer this call before the wilt. Water must penetrate through the roots; dashing water against the soil not only hardens it but often exposes some plant roots, or even up-roots plants with shallow root system. Regular and systematic cultivation is a better practice than too often and too superficial waterings. In using the hose, turn the spray upward and use a fine spray so that your watering will seem more like rain. Leave the hose in one place until all that part of the garden is well moistened, especially the soil, which is better off saturated, than just wet.
